## Kendall Boat Shed travels to Murwillumbah.

ne of the premier offerings from Kendall Boat Shed is the organised Away Paddles ("AP"). Our latest journey to Murwillumbah was among the furthest and, consequently, the longest. It proved to be worth the travel with the itinerary featuring a variety of paddles, cycles and social activities. Eighteen keen club members rose to the challenge.

Murwillumbah Showground became our base camp, being the only facility for caravans within 20 km. Everything was clean, tidy and welcoming, providing an enjoyable stay within walking distance to town.

Our first paddle was at Byangum, embarking from Col Wiley Park on the banks of the Tweed River. We paddled several km along the beautiful Tweed before turning onto the Oxley River.

Our second paddle started from Tumbulgum, also on the banks of the Tweed River. Alarmingly, one of our paddlers, on an inflatable kayak, began to deflate – rapidly! Fortunately, a few people still on the wharf were able to pull the paddler to safety, before getting too wet or sinking! It has since been attributed to 'user error', as the owner had misread the inflation instructions and used twice the recommended pressure. Our predicament was ultimately resolved by calling our land support team.

Our third and final paddle departed from Crams Farm Reserve with the destination being Clarrie Hall Dam. The paddle was spectacular and a fitting finale to our trip.

Although Base Camp wasn't situated on a

waterway – requiring transport for each paddle
– the showground is conveniently located
near the Northern Rivers Rail Trail. Some club
members also took a day to travel to Kingscliff,
which featured another wonderful cycleway,
offering a 60 km round trip.

Another notable highlight of this, our final AP of the year, was the addition of brief nightly entertainment

As we wrap up another year filled with paddling, cycling, and socialising, we reflect on our club's many adventures. And although we're still talking about the 'Great Deflate' anecdote and the belly-laugh entertainment, we eagerly await next year's adventures!

## Preserving Camden Haven's past. from an interview with Barbara Holebon

The Laurieton Historical Society Museum may be small, but it holds a mighty collection of stories, photos, and artefacts that celebrate Camden Haven's rich history. Entirely volunteer-run, the museum survives on \$3 entry fees, local donations, and the dedication of community members like Barbara Holebon.

Originally from Sydney, Barbara found herself in Laurieton after helping her cousin recover from surgery - and never left. "I wasn't into history," she laughs, "but I loved the idea of saving things from the past for the future." With her background in administration and security, Barbara quickly became an anchor for the museum's volunteer team, helping modernise systems, care for records, and ensure everyone feels valued.

The museum faces familiar challenges: limited space, heritage restrictions, no air-conditioning, and mounting costs. Yet, through

determination and community spirit, it continues to digitise documents, safeguard fragile items, and welcome visitors eager to connect with the past.

Barbara's belief is simple: "These aren't just



Onya bike folks.

Better by Bicycle Port Macquarie
("BBBPM") is now featuring various
cycle routes throughout the Camden
Haven area. Known as 'Tuesday Trails with
Stephanie', their latest ride followed a route
from Kew to Dunbogan, via North Haven
Beach. Starting at 8:00 a.m., 16 cyclists set
off from the Royal Hotel Kew car park on
the 36 km, Grade 2 route. The relatively flat
course follows shared pathways, interrupted
in various places by a few hundred metres
of road.

Unfortunately, they encountered their first obstacle quite early on. Upon entering the western end of Queens Lake track, they found the track in poor condition—almost inaccessible from Sirius Drive to the Sailing Club on anything less than a mountain bike.

Although the group persevered on the way in, they decided to tackle the traffic on the return leg, later in the day. "That's a busy stretch of main road, and we had to use it because of the deteriorated condition of a purpose-built track," lamented one rider. Thankfully, with skill and cautious road sense, the group safely navigated the challenges.

Fortunately, that was the worst of it, as the rest of the journey was magnificent. They meandered along the picturesque lakeside boardwalk and trail, which extended to the border of Laurieton. One rider remarked that she was discovering parts of the area she hadn't known existed. Upon reaching the main road again, they traveled a short distance before accessing the shared pathway over North Haven Bridge, riding through the mangroves and ultimately following the Camden Haven foreshore toward the breakwall. Once more, they chose to ride the quiet back streets instead of the shared pathway, as the breakwall can be quite dangerous during busy times. Retracing their steps over the bridge, they



hugged the waterline through Laurieton and crossed the Laurieton Bridge toward Dunbogan.

The group ultimately disembarked at Dunbogan Boatshed & Marina, where they were welcomed as regulars, this being their fourth visit in recent months. Sean and Sabine Coenraad manage the café on Tuesdays and Wednesdays and quickly accommodated the 16 brightly dressed patrons. Sean says, "Of

course, we know the locals, but now we're recognizing the cycling groups as well. The B2B has opened up

Dunbogan to everyone who wants to walk or cycle. We see entire families in hi-vis and helmets."

This particular cycle group is the inspiration of Stephanie Todd, whose recently expanded routes of the Camden Haven area have so far included rides from Johns River to Crowdy Bay, Logans Crossing to Kendall, and the aforementioned ride from Kendall to Dunbogan via North Haven along the B2B shared pathway.

In addition to organizing various social rides throughout our entire LGA (Local Government Area), BBBPM advocates for safer cycling infrastructure. They collaborate with the local council, providing advice on planning, to include the needs of all transport users. Here is a fresh take on the Christmas classic rum balls. We replace rum with lemoncello for a White Christmas treat!

280gm of cake crumbs (*Approx 3 cups*) made by hand crumbling store-bought Madeira Cake.

3 Tablespoons Lemon Curd – either homemade or store bought.

3 Tablespoons of White Magic flavoured Drinking Chocolate (*Available from Woolworths Lake Cathie*)

3 Tablespoons of Lemoncello – we us Maria River Distillery (*Available from Stall #47 Tunis Street Laurieton Riverwalk Markets*) *Added at the end...* 

2 Tablespoons of lemoncello2 Tablespoons of lemon curd150 gm Organic Desiccated Coconut(Available from Forgiving Foods Laurieton)

Place cake crumbs, lemon curd, white magic flavoured drinking chocolate and lemoncello into a bowl; mix well. Take tablespoonfuls of mixture and roll into balls using wet hands.

Warm extra 2 Tablespoons of lemon curd with 2 Tablespoons extra Lemoncello, stirring gently. Dip balls into this mixture then coat with desiccated coconut. Place into paper patty cases. Refrigerate until firm.


for a cosy night in.

## Words from our local wandering artist-writer.

his week I have been playing the role of a "flâneur", which AI tells me is a French term for an idle urban wanderer, an artist or writer who uses their observations of modern, urban society as inspiration for their work.

So for inspiration I have been wandering our beautiful Camden Haven, which has much built history worth preserving. A prime example is the School of Arts in Laurieton. The building houses the Camden Haven Neighbourhood Centre and the Camden Haven Historical Museum, and is the home of our local Camden Haven Historical Society. Named the School of Arts¹ for the movement which began in Sydney in 1833, it was also known as a 'Mechanics Institute'.

It promoted education for working class people, opened libraries, and offered classes and lectures, thus promoting local cohesion and support for communities. The movement spread quickly in the early 20th Century, so that now we find surviving buildings like ours

in various stages of decay in many country towns.

Our current Laurieton School of Arts was built in 1911, replacing two earlier versions. The first was blown down in 1898 by a gale, the second destroyed by fire. This third surviving building is described as a 'rare and remarkably intact example of a School of Arts' in its listing by NSW State Heritage. The building is also listed on the Port Macquarie Hastings Council Local Environmental Plan (hereafter LEP).

There are other local LEP heritage listed sites in Camden Haven, including the Pilot Station Complex and three graves at Camden Head, and a couple of cottages at North Haven. Once part of a larger group which have now mostly been renovated substantially, two cottages remain listed as good examples of holiday houses of the early 1960s. The training wall is listed, as is the cemetery at Laurieton, and the ANZAC War Memorial in the small park on Castle Street, Laurieton (corner Bold Street and Kew Road).

The Memorial statement of significance explains that the monument is representative of the beliefs of the community, its patriotism and allegiances and 'demonstrates the impact of world events on smaller communities throughout Australia'. The Holy Trinity Church, on the corner of Bold and Laurie Streets at Laurieton, is listed, it has important local history associations for many people.

The Former Post Office and dwelling in lower Laurie Street are listed, an important area of Laurieton for local history and particularly significant because it is situated where local Indigenous and maritime history meet. The south end of Laurie Street was

the main street, as the community relied on shipping for trade.

Goods like timber and bags of oysters were shipped to Sydney from the old wharf, the remains still evident at the bottom of the street. This was also where the punt took people across to Dunbogan, before the bridge was built. It was also a place where local Indigenous people would meet prior to European settlement, enjoying a seafood meal and leaving behind remains to show where they were. Also important for their history is Dooragan (North Brother), described by State Heritage as an Aboriginal Place under the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974. State Heritage Inventory explains that The Three Brothers dreaming story 'links the Three Brothers Mountains Middle and North Aboriginal Place to the Three Birpi Brothers Mountains South Aboriginal Place'.

However not all of our heritage is recognised adequately. We could recognise the historical value and heritage of other local sites. For example in Laurieton we could list the 1957 Plaza Cinema, corner of Bold and Laurie Streets; a timber public school building on Bold Street at the Laurieton Primary School; the original 1899 timber Longworth home in Laurie Street; and the remains of a Memorial Avenue of Trees<sup>2</sup>. With a little effort there is potential for us to create a heritage zoned area of local significance in Laurieton<sup>3</sup>.



Don't worry if you missed this concert, there is one more for the year scheduled





## Gardenhints and nature's wonders.

## December's garden.

The first month of Summer has arrived. With Christmas and the New Year only a few weeks away, it is time to prepare our gardens for the busy season ahead.

Hydrangeas are producing a magnificent display and are consistently a summer favourite with Australian gardeners for Christmas colour.

Mulch well and water daily to keep plants fresh and flowering. Ideally, a position in the morning sun and afternoon shade will provide a perfect spot.

Feed regularly with *Sudden Impact* and a small application of *Organic Life*.

They will also grow successfully in containers where they can be moved to enjoy the colour in summer. Always use a premium potting mix to give them a good start.

Removing spent flowers will help to ensure a longer flowering season.

Another Christmas favourite is the NSW Christmas Bush (pictured).

Stunning red colour, these plants must be grown in a well-drained soil. If you have heavy soils, consider growing them in a large container using a native planting mix.

A small feed after Christmas with *Native Slow Release* will keep them happy.

With summer heat approaching, now is the perfect time to mulch pots and gardens.



This helps to retain moisture and helps to protect shallow roots from summer temperatures. I normally recommend mulching to a depth of 20-50mm, and avoid placing mulch close to the base of plants. In addition to mulching, an application of a wetting agent will ensure that moisture is available to the subsoil.

Harvest herbs regularly to ensure good flavour and to prolong the plant. This can also slow some herbs from bolting to seed in summer. A fortnightly feed with liquid fertiliser will maintain good growth and flavour.

To help reduce the outbreak of fungal problems occurring in our herb and veggie garden, water early in the morning if possible.

With the noticeable absence of bees in the garden this spring, now is the time to consider making our gardens safer and more appealing for the pollinators to be welcome in our gardens. Look at planting a diverse selection of perennials and native flowering plants, if possible, with flowering throughout the seasons.

There is a range of safer sprays now available to reduce the impact on our bee populations in the garden. Talk to the local garden centre about options now available.

## Cosmic visitor or cosmic messenger?

Sometimes a rock is just a rock. Or is it?

If you don't know about 3I-Atlas you are missing the greatest space event of our lifetimes. When the faint glow of 3I-ATLAS re-emerged from behind the Sun in early November 2025, telescopes from Chile to Hawaii were waiting. What astronomers saw reignited one of the liveliest space debates since Oumuamua sped past in 2017. Is this merely another interstellar comet, asteroid, or something far stranger?

#### The Comet Story: A Predictable Oddball.

For most astronomers, 3I-ATLAS (named for the Asteroid Terrestrial-impact Last Alert System that first spotted it) behaves like what it technically is: an interstellar comet which is 11km across, 33 billion tons and travelling at an amazing 200,000km/hr. NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory and the Minor Planet Center both confirm its orbit is hyperbolic, meaning it's just passing through our Solar System – a one-time tourist from another star.

The latest post-perihelion data shows a non-gravitational acceleration – a tiny push caused when sunlight warms the comet's surface, sending jets of vaporised gas puffing into space like microscopic thrusters. numbers line up neatly. A natural comet at those temperatures can eject molecules at roughly 300 m/s; to account for the observed acceleration, the nucleus would have lost about 13 percent of its mass – dramatic, but not impossible. If that's true, the James Webb Space Telescope should soon detect a swollen cloud of gas and dust surrounding it. That, say the traditionalists, will close the case: exotic yes, intelligent no.

## The Anomaly-Hunters: Reading Between the Orbits.

Loeb's own analysis, however, reads more like a cosmic detective story. His Galileo Project at Harvard exists precisely to chase such outliers, and 3I-ATLAS provides plenty.



First, its retrograde trajectory sits within only five degrees of the ecliptic plane – a coincidence with odds of just 0.2 percent. Second, it showed a sunward jet, or "antitail," that isn't a trick of perspective. Third, it's massive – a million times heavier than 'Oumuamua and a thousand times bulkier than 2I/Borisov – yet moving even faster. The odds of that trio of traits appearing together? Under 0.1 percent.

Then come the chemistry surprises: a nickel-to-iron ratio far higher than in any known comet, with nickel-cyanide levels resembling industrial alloys, and a mere 4 percent water content – strange for an object supposedly made of ice. Even its light is off-beat: extreme negative polarisation (unseen in other comets) and a bluish hue brighter than the Sun's spectrum near perihelion. And to spice the lore, its incoming direction lies within 9 degrees of the sky patch that produced the famous 1977 "Wow!" radio signal.

For Loeb and others willing to color outside the lines, these are not quirks but breadcrumbs. The comet's acceleration could still stem from ordinary evaporation – yet if no giant gas cloud appears in December's Webb images, he argues, a different mechanism must be at work. A technological one, perhaps: the kind of high-velocity exhaust that would

need to shed far less mass than natural ice jets.

Science or Belief?

That suggestion triggers reflexive discomfort among many peers. After all, "alien probe" headlines tend to outrun evidence. But Loeb's defenders – from astrophysicists to curious readers like Dr Sukanto Bhattacharya of Deakin University (Australia) – see his openness as intellectual courage, not heresy. Bhattacharya likens the backlash to Galileo's run-ins with the church: a warning that even modern science can become its own orthodoxy.

#### Between Wonder and Skepticism.

So where does that leave the rest of us, the sky-watchers reading from our café tables and phone screens? Probably somewhere in the middle. The mundane truth - that chunks of distant planetary systems occasionally wander through ours - is already thrilling. Yet the possibility, however slim, that one of them might not be a random rock keeps curiosity alive. By year's end, as Webb and Earth-based observatories collect more spectra, 3I-ATLAS will tell us what it is: comet, curiosity, or calling card. Until then, both camps share one essential thing – the childlike wonder that looks up at a streak of blue light across the stars and whispers... "What if?" Keep a lookout in December and onward.

Follows the lives of eight very different couples, as they deal with their love lives in various loosely interrelated tales. All set during a frantic month before Christmas

in London, this movie solidified itself as a classic Christmas comedy over the past two decades - and for good reason. Its formula has been copied time and time again, with films like "Valentine's Day" and "New Years Eve" attempting to pull off the all-star-genius that is Love Actually. But they just can't seem to hit the right notes, unlike Billy Mack.

It stars Hugh Grant, Emma Thompson, Colin Firth, Kiera Knightley, Liam Neeson, Bill Nighy, Alan Rickman, Martin Freeman, Rowan Atkinson, Billy Bob Thornton and many, many more.

That list alone should be reason enough to watch it if you haven't, but beyond the star power is the story. > layers of inside jokes, which the audience is brought into effortlessly, and relationships that transcend the usual art of cinema.


