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Happenings on the home front.

Koala rescuer tells her story. by Alison Stewart




Deanne Castle firmly believes in – and lives by – her mantra, “No koala left behind.” Consequently, she’s become a familiar sight along Ocean Drive and surrounding tracks. Always with an elaborate camera in hand, she makes her daily rounds documenting the local population, aptly earning her nickname “the Koala Lady.” She’s quick to say, “The camera is not simply for taking pretty pictures. It is vital for koala identification, as I’m able to differentiate them by the distinctive markings on their noses and bottoms. The camera has also proven a valuable diagnostic tool, sometimes revealing obscure injuries or illnesses, such as ocular chlamydia.”

Having lived in the area since 2000, Deanne (also known as De) did not encounter her first koala until 2022 at Queens Lake. Shortly thereafter, she had her second sighting, and as luck would have it, she met Scott from the Koala Hospital. He’d been called out to rescue a koala following a dog attack. Little did she know, they’d meet again, when he trained her as a koala rescuer. Next she heard dreadful news, a motor vehicle had hit two koalas in Laurieton, resulting in the death of the joey and the mother running off, probably injured. Two days later, her daughter called her to help with a koala seen limping in the same area, presumed to be the injured mother. In fact, this proved to be a male – a third koala in that specific area! After several amateur rescue attempts and numerous phone calls, while desperately hoping the koala would not run off, a qualified rescuer arrived. The koala was promptly confined in a crate and transported to Hospital.

This darker side of living alongside koalas was the catalyst for De’s mantra and set her on this path. Her first step was to inform local council about the koala population and suggest the need for warning signs. After all, she hadn’t even been aware that she lived amid a koala habitat – and had been so for over two decades! Initially, the council advised (I summarise here), very few koala sightings had been reported; however, if she was willing to monitor and record their activities, the

council would be very receptive. De stepped up immediately, and the rest, as they say, is history.

Up to 2022, there was only a handful of recorded sightings, but now Deanne’s map is full. Her rounds (around 10k) take her along Queens Lake track, through Henry Kendall Reserve, Laurieton Cemetery, and both sides of Ocean Drive. This is a daily VOLUNTEER commitment of 4 to 5 hours! In this regard, every set of eyes help. She encourages the public to report ALL sightings using the Port Macquarie Koala Hospital website (details below).

De’s often called upon to rescue sick or injured koalas. The greatest danger in our area is cars, particularly on Ocean Drive. This busy road not only intersects their habitat, requiring koalas to cross regularly, but some koalas traverse to and from the mountain, particularly during mating season (August–February).

Working closely with Council, De has been instrumental in the interactive signage and speed lights, now installed adjacent to Laurieton Cemetery. Although many drivers feel genuine pleasure in earning the smiling green koala symbol (and this writer is one), there are still those that don’t. Just recently, a 4WD ran over a koala, somehow missing it with its wheels. Luckily, the koala did not appear physically injured (though I do wonder, do they have nightmares). These signage measures only cover a small portion of koala hotspots associated with Ocean Drive. Koalas regularly cross the road from Laurieton to Lakewood, with a mother and joey recently sighted near Fairwinds Estate. One lucky witness, Lyn Groves, said, “The traffic stopped in both directions and allowed them to cross safely. It

was such a wonderful sight to see. I only pray they’ll be as lucky next time.” We all do, Lyn!

After cars (and again, totally preventable), the most dangerous threat is unleashed dogs. Most dog owners follow the rules – established for a reason – especially in known koala zones. De explains, “There is specific signage in Port Macquarie Koala Habitat areas, noting unleashed dogs are prohibited. I would love to see these signs installed in the Camden Haven. No one wants to see a koala needlessly injured. Education has got to be the key, which is the very purpose of detailed signage.”

De’s passion was ignited by her first rescue. While continuing her volunteer position, she has completed studies in Certificate II in Animal Care and Certificate III in Wildlife and Exhibited Animal Care, broadening her knowledge and qualifications. Throughout her journey, she has remained dedicated to advocacy, education and her mantra, “No koala left behind!”

Everyone can do their part.

On the third Sunday of every month, Camden Haven enjoys the culmination of our many markets, with Laurieton's Riverwalk Markets. Next time you visit, whether armed with your veggie list or just checking out the sights, be sure to stop by Marine Rescue ("MR"). Just follow your nose and it will lead you directly to their BBQ fundraiser. But now, beyond their signature sausage sandwich, MR offers an engaging activity for the entire family.

Recently, MR began displaying one of their two rescue boats, for anyone interested in an inspection. Moored beside their headquarters is the Camden Haven 20, MR's impressive 10-meter Naiad vessel. Their other, smaller vessel, is a RHIB, rigid-hulled inflatable boat. It's used for most river rescues, as the larger vessel can't pass under the local bridges. You'll hear this and many more anecdotes from the MR volunteers, who enjoy entertaining their visitors.

Often, an interested local realises MR is precisely what they're looking for, as a future volunteer themselves. "The varied responsibilities extend well beyond boating duties", says Marie Roberts. She's been a radio operator for 11 years, as well as serving both as Fundraising and Uniform Officer.



(I must say, the uniforms do look very smart - check out the photo). The displayed vessel acts as a magnet for children. Who amongst us wouldn't be thrilled to sit in the captain's chair and steer (in our mind's eye).

When I met the Thorpe family, featured here, they were in the area visiting three generations of resident family. Actually, this was the culmination of a 12 month 'doing the lap' (complete with distance education!).

On this particular day, the Thorpe's had ventured to the wharf to waive to Grandy Mandy who was passing by on the Dragon Boat - her regular Sunday run. Having been a member of Sydney's Taronga Zoo for over a decade, I just couldn't imagine how its country cousin would measure up? Well, break out the condiments – I'm about to eat my words (do words have carbs?).

I ventured there last month with my visiting daughter and nine-month-old grandson and was blown away! Just 17 minutes up the highway, I arrived at the main entrance. (At Taronga, it took me longer to find a parking place – in the predesignated, prepaid, parking lot!) This time I walked straight in, not even a queue to break my stride, and was promptly welcomed by staff who detailed the day's activities.

The stars of Billabong Zoo are the animals, aptly known as their Ambassadors. Once again, my old-city-self would have scorned a zoo without giraffes and elephants, and once again, I was wowed! The animals are so close you feel you can

touch them, and in fact, signs warn you not to be tempted. The absolute standout for me was the lions – big, healthy, and active. We were thoroughly entertained with tricks as they interacted with the keeper. I'm going back just to see the lions again – seriously!

We attended five animal talks, although there were many more on offer. These events far exceed their label as mere 'talks'. Lasting about 20 minutes, they were entertaining, interactive, and fascinating experiences.

Beyond the above events, included with your entrance fee, you can opt for personalised encounters. These do require an additional charge and advance booking, but I highly recommend their consideration to anyone wishing to share a special experience with your child or grandchildren. This is the stuff their memories are made of – and yours too for that matter.

On that note, while writing this article I decided to adopt a koala, Berry, choosing her from photos. My sponsorship made a wonderful Christmas gift for my grandson (who seems to lack for nothing). My hope is that we'll visit Berry, seeing her progress and her future joeys. Chequer Toast.

Developed by Olwen Williams

1 loaf wholemeal sourdough sliced (from Scott's Bakery next to Coles Laurieton)
Spread each toast slice with lashings of butter (Real Butter – not margarine)

TOPPING #1

4 x eggs (from Mid Coast Egg Farm)
3 x Tbsp English Style Salad Cream
1 x green shallot finely chopped
Cracked Black Pepper
6 x tsp black lumpfish roe
Soft boil eggs for 6 mins. When cool peel and place in a medium bowl with salad cream, shallot and black pepper.
Placed egg mixture onto toast then top with lumpfish roe.

TOPPING #2

6 x slices of Norwegian Smoked Salmon (from Port Seafood)
1/2 x cup Philadelphia Cream Cheese
1 x tsp wasabi paste
Juice of half a lemon
1 x tsp of baby capers
6 x tsp of Salmon Pearls (from Port Seafood)
Mix all ingredients (except Salmon Pearls) well and apply liberally then top with Salmon Pearls.

TOPPING #3

6 x slices of Smoked Cheese (I use home-made cold-smoked cheese)
Roasted Capsicums in Olive Oil, Truffle Balsamic, Truffle Oil & Garlic (I always roast my own)
Place slices of smoke cheese onto toast. Place generous piles of Roasted Capsicums on top.

TOPPING #4

6 x tbsp of Home Made Pate (or store bought liverwurst is also nice)
1 x slice red salad onion separated into rings
6 x cherry tomatoes
12 x rocket leaves.
Spread toast liberally with pate & top with tomatoes, red onion & rocket.

Garden hints and helping growth.

February's garden.

As we approach the final month of summer, February can be the most challenging month.

With the recent dry weather conditions, our gardens are looking a bit tired. Add mulch to the garden beds, and deep watering to encourage healthy, strong growth. Check potted plants to ensure water is being absorbed. A wetting agent applied to the surface will ensure effective watering. Heat-stressed gardens will also respond to a liquid Seaweed such as Maxicrop or Powerfeed. This can be applied monthly during the growing season.

There's nothing nicer than the welcome shade from trees during the hot weather. With gardens becoming a lot smaller, there are still plenty of options to choose from to help us create that shaded space for summer.

The local garden centres will be able to assist with ones that are suitable for our local conditions.

Now is a suitable time to prepare for planting in autumn. Veggies and Herbs. Add plenty of well-rotted manure and compost to the garden and let the soil rest for a few weeks before planting.

Azaleas and Camellias will respond to a good prune and tidy before Autumn. Apply a small handful of Azalea & Camellia fertiliser to the drip zone. I like to add some compost around the base in addition to feeding.

Summer flowering perennials and Hydrangeas can be given a prune and tidied up now as well.

Roses are looking a bit sad, give them one-third prune and a good feed of high Potash fertilisers, and they will flush again for Autumn.

Lawn grubs are highly active now and can destroy a good lawn within days. >>



>> Fortunately, there are a lot safer options to use now to control the grubs before the damage occurs.

Citrus trees are also being damaged by Citrus Leaf Miner. Yates Success or Eco oils can be used to regain control.

Welcome to Poets Corner.

Our esteemed editor tells me that he has received some interesting submissions of poetry recently, but that he just doesn't have enough room for lengthy poems. So we will begin the New Year with this little corner for our poets, in which we can consider different forms of poetry with examples of differing forms.

The first poem I personally offer (below) is a ballad, an old form which employs quatrains with a rhymed second and fourth line. This ballad describes the journey of our beautiful Camden Haven River, from its beginnings high up in the Comboyne escarpment, to the completion of its journey through the estuary and into the ocean.

This edition celebrates a lively mix of poetry styles, from classic ballad and playful limerick to reflective free verse. Each form brings its own rhythm and character, showing how structure can shape both meaning and mood. *Transience: the Camden Haven River* unfolds in ballad form, tracing the journey of water from mountain mist to open ocean. Its steady cadence mirrors the river's movement, evoking change, renewal, and the quiet persistence of life along its banks. Darren Swatton's free verse pieces, *30 Pubs* and *Goon*, create vivid word pictures

through simple, honest observation. These poems resonate with anyone who has backpacked around Ireland or wandered through the country, discovering warmth, generosity, and friendship in unexpected places. They remind us that often it's not the destination that matters, but the moments shared along the way.

Anon's limerick, *Laurieton*, adds a bright, joyful note, with the line "a breeze full of glee" standing out as a terrific metaphoric illusion.

Next edition, we might explore more poetic forms for readers to try.

The inaugural **Camden Haven Words & Music Festival** is being planned right here in North Haven, Kendall and Laurieton for the June Long Weekend 2026.

This event will feature an art competition and exhibition, poetry reading and competition, author presentations and book signings plus six major and varied concerts covering a wide variety of musical genres and ensemble configurations.

Namely, this four-day event will kick off with local jazz ensemble "Dinner With Milton" as the festival opener on Friday June 5th in the newly refurbished Club North Haven auditorium.

The current program has Saturday as the Official Festival Opening at the Laurieton School of Arts hall with addresses from Dr Jeanell Carrigan AM and visiting poet Mark Tredinnick OAM. The art installation will be open over three days in-situ at Laurieton Hall.

Saturday afternoon sees fine musical performances at the Kendall School of Arts hall with professional chamber music group Trio Novalis. This trio is made up of Dr Jeanell Carrigan AM, piano, Dr Goetz Richter AM, violin and visiting Sydney cellist, Dr. Minah Choe. Repertoire will include favourite trios by Schubert and Dvořák.

We stay in Kendall for Saturday evening's showcase of Musical Theatre Favourites, programmed and led by Narelle Yeo from The Sydney Conservatorium's Musical Theatre

Program. She is bringing with her Sydney's newest and brightest upcoming stars!

Sunday morning will be one of the highlights! A very unique presentation and performance by composer George Palmer OAM as he discusses his song writing to texts by Australian author Tim Winton & Australian poets Judith Wright, Bruce Dawes and Kenneth Slessor. This will be curated by Jeanell Carrigan with performances by Narelle Yeo and Douglas Ross.

What is a Sunday afternoon without a good jazz concert? Well kick back and enjoy the tinkling of the ivories by Sydney jazz great, Dr Kevin Hunt. Kevin will be joined by sultry jazz vocalist Nikki Crayson. New horizons will be explored when Kevin introduces a new collaboration with himself and mid-coast indigenous artist, Maanyung. Monday morning is the culmination



concert and official closing of the weekend where we present the 15-piece Verbrugghen String Orchestra – also from The Sydney Conservatorium of Music, masterfully led by Dr Goetz Richter AM.

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Another Bali holiday? Nah! Space!

Space tourism is dawning on the travel industry.

The dream of space travel, once confined to the realms of science fiction, is rapidly becoming a tangible reality. In 2025, the space tourism industry is experiencing unprecedented growth, with companies like Blue Origin leading the charge. The recent Katy Perry all-girl mission has not only captivated the public's imagination but also paved the way for a future where space travel is as commonplace as a plane journey.

This isn't just about billionaires escaping Earth's gravity for a few fleeting minutes. We are at the dawn of a new era – one where space is no longer the exclusive domain of astronauts or scientists but a destination open to curious civilians, adventurers, and even vacationers. What was once the stuff of Star Trek and Asimov novels is quickly becoming part of our everyday lexicon: spaceports, suborbital flights, zero-gravity lounges, and lunar resorts.

The initial phase of space tourism has been largely suborbital flights that shoot passengers just past the boundary of space, letting them float in microgravity and glimpse the curvature of Earth before returning home. Blue Origin's New Shepard and Branson's Virgin Galactic are perfecting this quick-hop model, and demand is already high, with passenger rosters filling up months in advance.

But the next generation of travel is orbital – and beyond. SpaceX, with its Dragon capsule and upcoming Starship, is preparing for longer-duration flights, possibly circling Earth multiple times or ferrying tourists to lunar orbit. Soon, we may board sleek, reusable rockets from dedicated spaceports, jetting off into the stratosphere with the same casual confidence we step onto international flights.

Initially, the destination will be the journey: a few minutes in zero gravity, a view of the Earth no photograph can prepare you for. But that's just the beginning. Next stop? Earth orbit. SpaceX and others are laying the groundwork for private missions to the International Space Station and eventually to other worlds.

Lunar bases are already on the drawing board. NASA's Artemis programme and various commercial partners are planning sustainable Moon habitats, which could be adapted for tourism. Mars is a longer shot, perhaps though just a few decades away!

Space hotels are no longer sci-fi; they're serious business. Orbital Assembly Corporation plans to launch Voyager Station by the end of the decade, a rotating space station that mimics gravity via centrifugal force. Aerospace firms are already designing luxury accommodations for low Earth orbit. These will cater to both short-term tourists and long-term researchers, blending adventure with comfort.

While big price tags remain steep, costs are dropping rapidly thanks to reusability, private competition, and maturing technology. In the same way air travel evolved from an elite luxury to an everyday utility, space tourism is following the same curve.

Analysts expect the market to grow into a multi-billion-dollar industry by the 2030s. It won't be long before travel agencies offer "space vacation packages" and high schools run zero-gravity science camps. It's closer than you think. In 2024 alone, we saw multiple

successful missions with civilian passengers.

By the end of the decade, regular orbital vacations and even lunar flybys could be a reality. By 2040, it's likely that the middle class will have viable options for saving or financing a trip to orbit. The future isn't just coming, it's launching. The final frontier is open for business, and before long, space will be just another dot on the travel map. A little farther than Paris or Tokyo, perhaps, but infinitely more awe-inspiring.

And once that door swings fully open, all bets are off.

Forget postcards, your holiday snaps will include sunrise every 90 minutes, Earth hanging like a fragile Christmas ornament, and the odd moment of panic when your sandwich floats away mid-bite. Space tourism won't just sell tickets; it'll sell bragging rights, cosmic perspective, and the ultimate dinner-party one-upmanship. "Oh, you went to Bali? Lovely. I went to orbit."

There'll be space honeymoons, orbital weddings, and probably at least one reality TV show filmed in zero-G chaos. Space won't replace Earthly travel, but it will redefine adventure. The age of packing sunscreen and a spacesuit has officially begun.

Exhibitions abound. Bonny Hills Art Prize. Crystalline Pottery.

Bonny Hills was buzzing with colour, creativity and community spirit mid January, as two much-loved exhibitions drew visitors from across the region and beyond.

Held at St Agnes Frances Retreat, the 2026 Bonny Hills Art Prize welcomed more than 1,200 visitors over five days, with the majority travelling from the Port Macquarie-Hastings area. The popular annual event showcased 404 artworks, with an impressive 82 pieces sold – including three heading overseas to England.

This year's top honour, Best Work in Exhibition, the ADBRI Award, was awarded to Julie Mills for her evocative piece *Old Track to Uluru*. Judges praised the work for its sense of journey and emotional depth. Other standout winners included Felicity Rabe (*Study – Pomegranates*), Anne Falkner (*Enjoying Roto House*), Leah Gartner (*Salt and Thunder*) and Sarah Spencer (*Tiger*), with categories spanning oils, watercolour, mixed media, pastel and drawing.

Young artists also took the spotlight, with Youth and Junior Awards recognising emerging talent including Luke Baker, Olive Zischke and William Sawtell. Adding a unique twist, children attending the

workshops formed their own judging groups, selecting their favourite works – an initiative that organisers say helps nurture confidence and creative thinking.

In total, 94 children took part in hands-on workshops led by experienced local artists, making the event as much about participation as exhibition.

Running nearby the art prize was a special showcase by Bonny Hills-based Crystalline Pottery artist Rod Page, with all proceeds donated to the Mark Hughes Foundation. Raising over \$8,000 for the charity and even

the kids raised over \$400 on their own.

Rod's luminous porcelain pieces – famous for their signature crystal glazes – have been developed over decades of experimentation, producing stunning, one-of-a-kind works that are both beautiful and functional.

From sculptural vases and platters to birdbaths, designer basins and striking water features, Rod's work continues to attract collectors from around the world, while remaining deeply rooted in the local community. Rod sat at his potters wheel and demonstrated the art involved in turning clay to objects. He also gave technical info about his glazing kiln to a captured and very interested audience.

Together, the two exhibitions highlighted the strength of Bonny Hills' creative culture – a place where art, craftsmanship and generosity go hand in hand.

Critiques and Reviews.

Something special. Old but amazing.

This month's review is on a double volume of a classic piece of literature from 1860. With beautiful detailed etchings in both colour and black and white.

Cassell's Natural History Vol 1 & 2: Mammalia and Vol 3 & 4: Birds, Fishes

In an age before documentaries, field guides, and high-definition wildlife photography, the natural world came alive for readers through books like Cassell's Natural History. Published in the late nineteenth century by Cassell & Company, the series was among the most ambitious popular science projects of its time – designed not for elite scholars, but for the curious public.

The four volumes reviewed here – Volumes I and II devoted to Mammalia, and Volumes III and IV covering Birds and Fishes

are

and the quiet fragility that comes from more than a century of turning pages.


Yet it is precisely this wear that hints at their past life – not as display pieces, but as books that were actively read, consulted, and valued.

Content-wise, Cassell's Natural History remains a compelling read. The text reflects Victorian science at a moment of transition: grounded in careful observation and classification, yet often coloured by period language and interpretation. Modern readers will notice outdated terminology and assumptions, but

these elements add historical depth rather than detract from the work. This is not just a record of animals – it is a record of how people once understood them.

Perhaps the most enduring appeal lies in the illustrations. The finely detailed engravings of mammals, birds, and aquatic life were a revelation to 19th-century audiences, many of whom would never encounter such species

firsthand. Even where foxing or fading has occurred, the images retain their power, offering both scientific detail and artistic craftsmanship. They are reminders of a time when illustration was essential to knowledge.



presented in two bound copies, each combining multiple volumes. Their condition is poor, marked by the unmistakable signs of age and long use: worn bindings, handling marks,

From a collector's perspective, the poor condition will naturally limit monetary value.

But from a journalistic or cultural standpoint, these volumes are rich artefacts. They speak to an era when education, curiosity, and wonder were bound together in heavy covers and shared across households, schools, and libraries.


In short, these bound volumes of Cassell's Natural History are not pristine survivors – but they are honest ones. Hugely interesting, historically resonant, and visually engaging, they deserve appreciation not for their condition, but for the story they tell – about animals, about science, and about the readers who once relied on them to understand the wider world.

Paul Thompson builds with heart, history and handcrafted soul. Born and raised in Wauchope and lifetime resident of Bonny Hills, Paul grew up with sawdust in his veins and a deep respect for honest craftsmanship. From an early age, he was inspired by his father, Max Thompson – one of the Mid North Coast's most respected builders – and today, that proud family tradition continues with Paul's own son now continuing the work.

"I think we're the oldest established building family in the area," Paul says with his wide quiet smile.

As the current President of the Oxley Division of the Master Builder's Association (Taree to Nambucca) and having a career spanning decades, Paul has seen the industry change, but his love for building and the skills he's developed stand alone.

He's passionate about passing on traditional building skills that will be valued by the next generation, believing that good construction starts with solid foundations, patience, and pride in your work.

One of Paul's most meaningful projects in recent years has been the rebuilding of Kylie's Hut, a much-loved local icon. More than just a structure, the rebuild was a labour of love – restoring not only hut, but also reconstructing

the old style concrete chimney and piers in its original form. Every detail was approached with care, respect, and an understanding of the hut's cultural and emotional significance.

Complementing this work is Paul's involvement with Guulabaa - Place of Koala, where traditional skills, natural materials, and thoughtful design come together beautifully. The handcrafted timber elements showcase a deep respect for the land and for woodworking as an art form – something Paul values immensely. For him, these aren't just builds; they're stories told through timber, texture, and time.

Paul completed his apprenticeship and training in Wauchope before becoming a fully licensed builder in 1984. Since then, he's worked on a wide range of projects across the region, always guided by the same principles: quality workmanship, clear communication, and genuine care for his clients.

Ask Paul what success means to him, and he won't talk about awards or accolades. Instead, he'll tell you it's about building beautiful spaces that bring enjoyment to people – places that feel good, function well, and stand the test of time.

Because for Paul Thompson, building has never just been about structures – it's about community, craftsmanship, and creating
