Sometimes the natural environment needs a helping hand.

nvironmental Citizen of the Year, Peter Berecry OAM, is renowned for his dedication to preserving nature and his commitment to community projects. Recently, Peter, along with a team of environmentalists and arborists, assisted Landcare in repairing a beloved osprey nest in Lakeview Crescent, West Haven. This nest has been a vital site for supporting multiple seasons of osprey breeding and fledging over the past six years.

The original nest, installed by lead arborist James Stapleton, had begun to show signs of wear from storms and seasonal use. Known

as the "osprey whisperer," James brings a unique skill set to the delicate task of building and maintaining osprey habitats. His love of the species ensures the nests are safe, sturdy, and perfectly suited to the birds' needs.

The repair effort involved careful planning and execution to minimise disruption to the ospreys' breeding cycle. The team reinforced the platform and restored the structure to its former glory.

This collaborative effort highlights the importance of community involvement in conservation and the role of dedicated



individuals like Peter Berecry and James Stapleton in protecting local wildlife. Their work ensures the Mid North Coast remains a sanctuary for these majestic birds.

### A colourful entrepreneurial environmental saver.

ngela Carroll's journey with Lids 4 Kids began four years ago with a small collection from family and friends. Initially, she donated the plastic lids to a local high school in Port Macquarie, where students created a vibrant mural for the playground. But when the school stopped the project, Angela was left with nowhere to send the lids, and she became concerned that they would end up in landfill.

Determined to find a sustainable solution, Angela discovered Lids 4 Kids (L4K) online. The organisation's mission matched her goals, and she connected with a volunteer who transports lids from Queensland to Canberra, where L4K's headquarters turn them into useful products like garden furniture, clipboards and skateboards.

From humble beginnings - just four or five boxes - Angela's collection recently grew to 44 boxes in a single pickup. She collects lids from local coffee shops, schools, aged care centers, and even hotels, sorting them by color and type. Beer and wine tops, saved in tin cans, are also sent to L4K, where proceeds from recycling support the program.

Those wishing to contribute can drop lids at several local coffee shops, helping Angela keep thousands of plastic lids out of waterways and landfills, one collection at a time.

The Lids collected include those from Milk Bottle Tops - both fresh milk and Long Life Milk, and Tops from Juice. Tops from Cream, Yogurt, Washing Detergent etc. are not acceptable as the machinery is only able to crush the smaller lids. Drop points are the Services Clubs, Riverview Cafe in North Haven, Bold Expresso in Laurieton and Bliss Coffee Shop in the Medical Complex behind Woolies in Lakewood.

# Camden Haven's origins.

he name Camden Haven is currently acknowledged by the Geographical Name Register of NSW as the name of a parish, a river, an estuary and an inlet, a trig station, two parks and a school, all situated on the Mid-North Coast of New South Wales, approximately 30km south of Port Macquarie. Today there is no village or town named Camden Haven, although Kendall and Laurieton have both in the past been named Camden Haven, and in its earliest days Laurieton was called Peach Orchard. This curious history was somewhat confusing for postal services and telegraph lines, and is worth exploring.

This naming of Camden Haven began in the 2nd expedition of John Oxley (1784–1828) who prudently named places after important people. In 1818, Oxley had turned east to the coast following the Hastings River, which he named for the then Governor General of India. He named Port Macquarie after his employer, Governor Lachlan Macquarie (1762-1824). Travelling south down the coast, the (boatless) expedition was blocked by our wide estuary

mouth. He explored around the entrance and Queens Lake into what he described as 'the haven, which we named after Lord Camden.' A haven, in the British naval language of the day, described a harbour or port. Lord Camden was John Jeffreys Pratt, 2nd Earl and First Marquess of Camden (1759-1840), then Teller of the Exchequer. Oxley also named


Queens Lake (after Queen Charlotte) and Watson Taylors Lake, after Lord Camden's Private Secretary, George Watson Taylor (1771-1841).

Although Port Macquarie was established as a penal settlement in 1821, The Camden Haven named by Oxley remained relatively remote for some time. Occasional lime burners came into the estuary to reap shell for lime to be used in buildings in Port Macquarie. Convicts and bushrangers were intermittently reported in the area, and in 1832 the NSW Postal Directory designated a 'Soldiers' hut' at the base of North Brother. Oysters were frequently harvested and shipped to Sydney. However it was not until the 1870s, when timber getters travelled through the hinterland and down the rivers, that people began to settle here. It was then that Camden Haven became a flexible name for various locations. We can follow the name changes through government publications of the times.

In 1875 the Post Office asked for tenders for mail delivery to and from Camden Haven and (Peach Orchard) Laurieton, twice a week. This clarifies that at that time, Camden Haven and Laurieton were two different places and that Laurieton was also known as Peach Orchard.

By 1882 Peach Orchard consisted of a post and telegraph office, a public school, several dwelling houses, and a sawmill: 'The settlement came into existence about seven years ago, and received, from the Postmaster-General of the day, the name of Laurieton, in compliment to Mr. Laurie, the proprietor of the mill, together with other public works on the Manning.'

In 1889, the New South Wales Government Gazette described the boundaries of Camden







Haven as 'Commencing at the waters of Camden Haven Inlet at the north-east corner of portion 72, and between Austral, Norman, Castle and Short Streets.'

Even officials of the time became confused; for example, in 1890 when considering a petition for a telephone connection, a petitioner sent the Superintendent of Telegraphs a sketch map of the locations to clarify place names (see Figure 1). Mr A. Thomson wrote 'that the petition refers to a place locally known as the 'Stables', which is situated 6 miles from Laurieton 2 miles from Camden Haven Punt and 1½ miles from Camden Haven.'

In 1891 the village further up the river changed its name, to honour the once-resident poet, Henry Kendall, and so the names of post offices were changed. Following this, an attempt at clarification was made by the Post

### Office, with these three notices in the *New South Wales Government Gazette*:

General Post Office, Sydney, 10th September, 1891, On and from the 1st proximo, the Post and Telegraph Office at present known as "Laurieton" and the Post Office known as "Camden Haven", will bear the designations of "Camden Haven" and "Kendall" respectively.

General Post Office, Sydney, 21st September, 1891, It is hereby notified that the designation of the Post and Telegraph Office at Laurieton will not be changed to "Camden Haven" as intimated in a notice dated 10th instant, but remain at present "Laurieton".


General Post Office, Sydney, 23rd October, 1891, On and from the 1st proximo, the Post Office at present known as "Camden Haven Punt", will bear the designation of "Camden Haven".

Yet it was not until 13 December 1946 that

the Minister for Lands officially declared the alteration of the name of the village of Camden Haven to Laurieton in the Government Gazette.

So today we have the villages of Laurieton (on the inlet) and Kendall (up the river),



(See Figure 2) in the Parish of Camden Haven. There is no village named Camden Haven. It makes you wonder if people at the time ever received their mail. Other villages in or near the parish have interesting place names, to be a following story in a later edition.

Barrington Coast Airshow transformed Taree's skies into a spectacle of aviation history and aerobatic prowess. The event attended by over 5000 enthusiasts, marked the first Australian appearance of a meticulously restored

Supermarine Mk VIII Spitfire (above), captivating audiences with its storied legacy and engineering excellence.

The airshow featured continuous aerobatic displays and flyovers by an array of historic warbirds, including the P-40 Kittyhawk, Australia's

sole Hawker Sea Fury, the formidable Grumman Avenger, the iconic Wirraway, and the T-28 Trojan. Notably, the event showcased the debut performances of the F4U Corsair, renowned for its distinctive gull wings and formidable reputation, and the De Havilland Vampire, a pioneer of the jet age.

Aerobatic virtuoso Paul Bennet and his team delivered exhilarating performances, with Bennet executing a solo routine in the 400hp Wolf Pitts Pro biplane. The team further impressed spectators with a three-ship Pitts Sky Aces formation, demonstrating precision and skill. Bennet's daring stunt of landing an aircraft atop a moving vehicle added to the day's thrills.

Beyond the aerial displays, attendees engaged with interactive exhibits, explored

> aircraft up close, perused market stalls, and enjoyed a car and motorcycle show. The event offered a comprehensive experience for aviation enthusiasts.

# Pets in paradise.

### Keeping your pets safe during the Australian summer heat.

s the Australian summer heats up, it's vital to keep our pets cool and safe. Just like us, they're affected by the heat, and some are more vulnerable than others, so keep them comfy in the sun.

### Know the signs of heatstroke.

Pets can suffer from heatstroke, which occurs when their body temperature rises dangerously high. Animals with thick coats, breathing issues, or short noses (like pugs or bulldogs) are at higher risk. Watch for excessive panting, drooling, red gums, weakness, or vomiting. If you notice any of these signs, cool them with tepid (not icy) water and get them to a vet.

### Tips to keep your pets cool.

Exercise at Cooler Times: Walk pets early in the morning or late evening when it's cooler. Avoid hot surfaces like asphalt – if it's too hot for your hand, it's too hot for their paws.

Shade and Fresh Water: Make sure your pet has access to shaded areas and plenty of fresh water. Indoors is best on extremely hot days, especially if you have air conditioning.

Never Leave Them in Cars or Utes: Leaving pets in vehicles can be life-threatening within minutes. Likewise, avoid letting them ride in ute trays on hot days, as the metal surface can burn them.

Sun Protection: Light-colored pets can get sunburned, so limit sun exposure and consider pet-safe sunscreen for extra protection.

### Don't forget small animals.

Smaller pets like rabbits, guinea pigs, and birds are also prone to overheating. Keep them in shaded, ventilated areas with access to fresh water and bring them inside on very hot days.

With a bit of planning, you can help your pet stay safe and cool through the summer. Watching for any signs of heat stress and staying mindful of their needs will ensure they enjoy the season right by your side.

### Recipe of the month

### Raisins: Peanut Whisky Danish

### Ingredients

- Puff pastry (use my go-to recipe from the Danish reel or store bought is totally fine)
- ½ cup raisins
- ¼ cup sugar + ¼ cup water (for syrup)
- 2 cups milk 4 egg yolks
- ½ cup sugar (for crème pât)
- 2 tbsp cornstarch 1 tbsp flour
- 2 tbsp peanut whiskey 1 tsp butter **Method:**
- **1. Soak Raisins:** Bring <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup sugar and water to a simmer. Pour over the raisins and let them soak while you get on with the good stuff.
- 2. Crème Pât: Heat milk in a saucepan till it's just simmering. Meanwhile, whisk egg yolks, sugar, cornstarch, and flour. Slowly pour the hot milk into the yolk mix (slowly, no scrambling here), then pop it back in the pan. Stir till thick and silky. Once thickened, whisk in butter and peanut whiskey. Let it cool.
- 3. Assemble: Roll out your puff pastry, spread that peanut whiskey crème pât on, then sprinkle with the soaked raisins. Roll it up tight, slice into swirls, and bake at 180°C until golden and puffed.

Enjoy a perfect flaky, creamy, boozy treat!

# It's written in the stars.

Religious narratives define this time of year.

It is the season and every year around this time people notice the brilliant 'star' to the East just before sunrise. For astronomers, we know it's the appearance of the planet Venus, but for a lot of folk it conjures up thoughts of the Christmas Star.

The 'Star of Bethlehem' is one of the most powerful, and enigmatic symbols of Christianity. For centuries historians have debated the nature of this biblical light that heralded the birth of Jesus. The true nature of the Christmas Star remains uncertain, and it's challenging to identify a single astronomical event that fits all the biblical descriptions. Theories continue to be debated, and the mystery of the Christmas Star adds an element of wonder to the Nativity story.

Regardless of the scientific explanation, the story of the Christmas Star holds cultural and religious significance for many around the world. In biblical times, the heavens held profound significance in the Middle East, shaping the religious and cultural fabric of the region. The heavens were perceived as the dwelling place of God, and the skies were considered a divine canvas reflecting cosmic order and the will of a higher power.

It was the only book of the bible that had all players in the same general place at the same time!

Now, historical records indicate that there was a rare series of planetary 'pairings' during



the years 3 B.C. and 2 B.C. As we watched the skies, the two brightest planets Venus and Jupiter started moving closer together. Wow! Like the final pieces of a jig-saw puzzle, our fabled biblical beacon started to reveal itself.

The crowning touch came ten months later, on 17 June 2BC, as Venus and Jupiter appeared to actually 'join up' in the constellation Leo!

This time the two planets were so close that, without binoculars, they would have looked like one single brilliant white beacon of light!

Jupiter was known as the 'planet of Kings' and it all took place in the constellation of Leo, denoting royalty and power. The whole sequence of events could have been enough for the fabled three wise men to see this as a sign in the heavens that the Messiah had been, or was about to be, born. Was this the fabled Christmas star?

Ultimately, the nature of the Christmas Star may never be definitively determined. The mystery surrounding it adds to the charm and fascination of the Christmas story, inviting contemplation and discussion across different fields of study. Whether it was a natural celestial event or a unique divine sign, the Christmas Star remains a symbol of hope and wonder during the holiday season.

Want to see the Christmas 'Star' for yourself? OK, get up early, head outside and gaze to the east from 4.30am. If you've got clear skies you can't miss it!



# Garden hints and nature's wonders.

### In the Garden of Eden you will find a garden of gardenias.

The first month of Summer has arrived. With Christmas and the New Year only a few weeks away it's time to prepare our gardens for the busy season ahead.

Hydrangeas are producing a magnificent display and a consistently a summer favourite with Australia gardeners for Christmas colour.

Mulch well and water daily to keep plants fresh and flowering. Ideally, a position in the morning sun and afternoon shade will provide a perfect spot.

Feed regularly with Sudden Impact and a small application of Organic Life.

They will also grow successfully in containers where they can be moved to enjoy the colour in summer. Always use a premium potting mix to give them a good start.

Another Christmas favourite is the NSW Christmas Bush.

Stunning red colour, these plants must be grown in a well-drained soil. If you have heavy soils, consider growing them in a large container using a native planting mix.

A small feed after Christmas with Native Slow Release will keep them happy.

With summer heat approaching now is the perfect time to mulch pots and gardens.

This helps to retain moisture and helps

to protect shallow roots from summer temperatures.

Harvest herbs regularly to ensure good flavour and prolong the plant. This can also slow some herbs from bolting to seed in summer. A fortnightly feed with liquid fertiliser will maintain good growth and flavour.

### Our birds. Where historical art meets nature.

**T**he Mid North Coast of Australia is home to a rich variety of bird species. Iconic residents include the kookaburra with its distinctive laugh, the colorful rainbow lorikeet, and lyrebirds, renowned for mimicking sounds. Environments along the coast provide vital habitat for migratory species like the Spangled Drongo,

which travels from as far away as PNG each year. These birds not only enhance ecosystems by controlling pests and dispersing seeds but also play a significant role in Indigenous knowledge and storytelling.

Bird conservation in Australia has deep roots, starting with the formation of the Gould League of Bird Lovers in 1909. The League promoted a Bird Lovers' Pledge, urging people to protect birds and avoid collecting eggs. By the 1940s, these principles became part of school education, shaping environmental values across generations. Over time, the League expanded its focus to sustainability and environmental education, offering programs like marine sanctuary



excursions and recycling initiatives.

A more recent initiative, the Birds of Australia Storybox, created by the Australian Museum, brings to life the bird illustrations of 19th-century naturalists John and Elizabeth Gould. This traveling installation offers interactive 3D displays, bird calls, and Indigenous storytelling, emphasising the importance of preserving native birdlife. It showcases how Australia's birds are not only ecologically significant but also culturally meaningful. Vanessa Finney and Louise Teteris from The Australian Museum opened the exhibition on the Port Macquarie Town Green on the 24th October.

With threats like habitat loss impacting

species such as the regent honeyeater, conservation efforts are more important than ever. The Gould League's programs and the Storybox installation inspire communities to protect bird habitats by planting native trees, reducing waste, and adopting sustainable

practices. The Nature School attended the opening and each child displayed their bird song skills.

Visiting The Birds of Australia Storybox is an outing for all. And just up the road.

The Mid North Coast's birdlife is not just a source of natural beauty - it is a vital part of the region's biodiversity. Initiatives like touring The Birds of Australia Storybox provide opportunities to connect with and protect these feathered treasures for years to come. # Critiques and Reviews.

This month we're only reviewing one particular film, because it's such a standout. But first, I wish to quickly mention a series: Industry (HBO). If you liked Skins, Mad Men, Succession, or Suits - Industry is a similar watch. It's a blend of coming-of-age drama, mixed with workplace thrill, set in the financial world of London. I binged all three current seasons within a few weeks.

Perhaps someday I will review the series, but for now - let's talk about a Documentary!

### The film - Shackleton: The Greatest Story Of Survival (Netflix)

If you don't know who Tim Jarvis is, you've been living under an Australian rock.

Our famous modern explorer, who rose to prominence by using century-old clothing and tools on expeditions to follow in the footsteps of Mawson and the like, is back. But this time, he is helping us follow in the footsteps of another great explorer; Antarctica's finest, Ernest Shackleton.

If you like documentaries, this is definitely for you. But even if you don't, the narrative of this story is unlike most docos. It captures the feeling of an adventure film, riddled with anxiety and curiosity as to what will unfold next. The film uses archival footage and images from 1914 to recreate the perilous journey Shackelton and his group of fearless explorers found themselves on.


Imagine, you believe you're about to cross the most unexplored and uninhabitable

A story about survival, leadership, morale, and human endurance, this documentary was thoroughly enjoyable - though sometimes disjointed. I found myself wishing I would remain with the archival scenes and be immersed in the story, right when Tim would pull me back out to the modern era to explain what I was watching. Other than that one small gripe, I highly recommend this film to everyone. It isn't just written and edited well, it also

managed to capture the feeling of such an overwhelming and awe-inspiring expedition. And that is no easy task for a filmmaker to (though I'm sure it was slightly easier than actually surviving in Antarctica).




### Funny Plaza happenings to help with circulation. by your Editor



A chat with *Noel Hiffernan OAM* by *Olwen Williams*.

Thatting with Noel was an eyeopener - not just about his interesting travel stories and community work with volunteers and the disabled, but also the front-page stories he's been part of. A colorful character indeed. North Haven's Noel Hiffernan was among those honoured in the Australia Day 2024 Honours List, receiving a Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) for his service to people with disabilities

and the community. Noel chaired Greystanes Disability Services for over a decade and has held governance roles with several organizations, including Breakthru, Connect Child and Family Services, SydWest Multicultural Services, and Mountains Youth Services Team. He also proudly served on the NSW Civil and Administrative Tribunal from 2002 to 2016.

A former presenter for 2Way FM, Noel now hosts a music show on Taree's 2BOB FM.

He is also on the Board of Laurieton United Services Club and currently serves his second term as President of Laurieton Rotary Club.

Noel was part of the State Steering Committee for the International Year of People with Disabilities in 1981, later joining a subcommittee covering topics from education to transport. He then went on to sit on the ACROD Access Committee. standards and was a founding member of Access to

individuals afford aids and appliances. After a chance conversation with Doug Anthony, a promise of \$5 million was fulfilled and allocated to establish the Aids & Appliances Funding Scheme, later managed by the state beauracracies.

Today, Noel continues advocating for better transport, healthcare, and education for people with disabilities. He remains active with Laurieton Rotary, which supports local schools, the RFS, Community@3, and international projects in Fiji, Vanuatu, and PNG through initiatives like book fairs and donations raised at the Laurieton Riverwalk Markets.

On the LUSC Board, Noel ensured the introduction of a wheelchair-accessible courtesy bus. He remains concerned about transport challenges for both disabled and mobility-impaired residents who rely on motorized scooters.

With International Day for People with Disabilities approaching on December 3rd, Noel reflects on his philosophy...

"I try to make every day a day for people with disabilities. If people see me doing the right thing, it might inspire them to do the same."

Noel exemplifies the spirit of volunteering and community service. Thank you, Noel, for your ongoing dedication and service.
